The Downtown Durham Rotary Club has awarded Jack Preiss its highest honor for a non-Rotarian, its Rotary Community Service Award, given annually to an individual who has demonstrated extraordinary commitment and service to the community.

Preiss, known for his long-standing commitment to affordable housing for all residents, was presented the honor at a reception earlier this week at the Washington Duke Inn & Golf Club. A professor emeritus of sociology at Duke University, Preiss has for decades been at the forefront of Durham's movement to create additional housing opportunities for all citizens.

Preiss also was given an honorary \$1,000 Paul Harris Fellowship by the Club, the highest honor for Rotarians.

Rotary president Susan Ross said Preiss was a natural choice.

"Jack is the epitome of service above self, which is the Rotary credo," she said. "What Jack has done for Durham is nearly beyond words. We're so proud of him — and honored to give him this award." Preiss addressed Rotarians after being presented the award.

"Affordable housing in this community must not be a luxury. It should be a right, something that is available to all," he said. "It's so important that we remember that. I'm very appreciative of this honor." Mr. Preiss was recognized for his numerous years of continuous service in the Durham community. He was made a Paul Harris Fellow, receiving a Certificate and Medallion. Mr. Preiss expressed his appreciation naming numerous club Rotarians for their support, assistance, guidance and leadership in many endeavors.

What are Global Networking Groups and how are they different from RI Structured Programs?

In practical terms, the new category of Global Networking Groups does not affect the activities of Rotary Fellowships or Rotarian Action Groups. Structured Programs are defined as “organized activities recommended by the RI Board for clubs and districts that include a recommended framework and guidelines.” Since fellowships are not based on a club or district-level structure, but rather are comprised of individuals from many different clubs and districts, they do not meet this definition. The new category of Global Networking Groups provides a specific niche for both group categories and is defined as “groups of individual Rotarians organized to focus on shared topics of interest on an international basis” (RCOP, 40.010).

What is the difference between a Rotarian Action Group and a Rotary Fellowship?

A Rotarian Action Group is a voluntary association of Rotarians formed for the purpose of conducting international service projects that advance the object of Rotary. A Rotary Fellowship is a group of Rotarians who unite themselves to pursue a vocational or recreational activity.

What if my recreational or vocational group also wishes to participate in service activities?

The new categories are not intended to discourage Rotary Fellowships from engaging in service activities, or to discourage Rotarian Action Groups from enjoying fellowship. Over the next year, each group will be asked to consider what its primary function is, and to identify itself as appropriate. It will be in every group’s best interest to accurately assess its classification, as each new set of policies is intended to address the specific needs of its respective category.
