## Dr. Richard Krasno



Dr. Richard M. Krasno, Executive Director of the Kenan Trust and President of the Kenan Fund presented an overview of charitable giving in the U.S. and the impact of the Trusts set up by the Kenan family. Dr. Krasno stated that giving by foundations has tripled since 1994. In 2004, the percentage breakdown of those who contributed the 352.12 billion was: Individuals – 74%; Foundations – 13%; Bequests – 8%; and Corporations – 5%. The recipients of most of the contributory funds were religious organizations, educational institutions, health and human service agencies, and managed charitable foundations.

The William R. Kenan, Jr. Charitable Trust is composed of four distinct funds: 1) Fund for private enterprises; 2) Engineering, Technology and Science; 3) Arts (includes the NC School of the Arts funding); and 4) Ethics Institute established in 1995 at Duke University. Since 1965, the Kenan Trust Funds have grown from 90 million to over 700 million. 772 grants totaling 379 million were awarded with the principal focus on education or the educational component of the research, program or project.

Exemplary grants awarded by the Kenan Trust have been: 1) Endowed professorships at American Universities; 2) 99 grants at UNC-Chapel Hill with 25 endowed “Eminent Professorships” dedicated to excellence in teaching; 3) Durham Scholars Program to set up afterschool enrichment programs for at-risk youth enrolled in 6<sup>th</sup> grade through college; and 4) Restoration of the personal retreat home of Thomas Jefferson in Lynchburg, Virginia with a focus on the educational components of the renovation and the historical significance of the site.

Since its inception the William R. Kenan, Jr. Charitable Trust Funds have given 920 grants totaling over 450 million to leverage other funds and support educational initiatives throughout the United States. . . . *Carolyn Titus*

**Rotary -- A Brief History**

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to recapture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The name "Rotary" derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.

. . . As Rotary grew, its mission expanded beyond serving the professional and social interests of club members. Rotarians began pooling their resources and contributing their talents to help serve communities in need. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its principal motto: Service Above Self.
