“North Carolina Arts in Action

Lisa Lang, Executive Director”

Our program on April 23rd featured the North Carolina Arts In Action program, a new non-profit organization in our area. Doug Zinn introduced the organization's executive director, Lisa Kang. Prior to joining NC Arts in Action, Lisa served in leadership positions with The New Detroit Science Center, the Seattle Symphony, and The New Haven Symphony Orchestra. Lisa holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business and Economics from Albertus Magnus College in New Haven, CT. She is married to Emil Kang, Executive Director for the Arts at UNC-Chapel Hill.



The mission of North Carolina Arts in Action is to transform the lives of North Carolina school children through dance. Using dance as a catalyst, North Carolina Arts in Action seeks to engage children and their communities through participation in the arts. Arts in Action fosters a love of the arts, pride of achievement, and a belief in themselves that will carry over into all aspects of their lives. Arts in Action strives for diversity - including students of all economic, ethnic and social backgrounds as well as special needs children.

North Carolina Arts in Action uses dance, an art form embodied by every society, as an enjoyable way for young children to develop discipline, self-esteem and a desire to excel. When children are able to express feelings and ideas through artistic movement, they gain self-awareness and often self-acceptance discovering new talents. The program becomes an incentive for students to achieve in the classroom, learn to work as a team, and develop respect for one another.

A close relationship is in place between Arts in Action and the National Dance Institute of New York (NDI: New York), a non-profit organization founded by former principal dancer of the New York City Ballet, Jacques d'Amboise. Jacques serves as the vice president of the North Carolina Arts in Action board of directors and provides guidance to North Carolina Arts in Action's Executive Director and Artistic Director. He is recognized as one of the finest classical dancers of our time and has been contributing his skills for over 30 years in the field of dance education.

Other National Dance Institute affiliate programs across the country have been very successful in metropolitan areas such as New York City, Santa Fe, Los Angeles and Aspen. North Carolina Arts in Action has modeled its program on these successful programs set in place by NDI: New York.

In January 2006, Arts in Action launched its 4th grade pilot program at Mel and Zora Rashkis Elementary School in Chapel Hill and is expanding within Rashkis Elementary and to other schools in the community and across the state. The program will launch in Durham this fall at Fayetteville Street Elementary School. Principal Queen Scarborough spoke briefly about the launch of the program. Lisa thanked Mary Ann Black for her help in developing the Fayetteville St. launch. The cost for implementing a full year of the program in a single school can range from \$65,000 to \$150,000 inclusive of multiple grade programs and afterschool programs.

Four children from Rashkis Elementary and their dance instructor gave a demonstration of the program in action for our Rotary Club. This was a powerful example of how the arts, particularly dance, build critical thinking skills, discipline, team work, self-confidence, and the joy and fun of learning! DISTRICT CONFERENCE HELD 4/20-21

President Susan and President-elect Toby were pleased to serve as Durham Rotary's official delegates to the District 7710 Conference, which was held the weekend of April 20-21 at the Friday Center in Chapel Hill. Also in attendance were Rotarians Ken Lundstrom and Lois Cranford from our club.

The conference opened with a dinner Friday night honoring Paul Harris Fellows and focusing on the important role of the Rotary Foundation in defining Rotary as more than an “eating club”. The RI President's official representative, Leigh Higinbotham of Vancouver, addressed about 200 delegates and guests. On Saturday, Susan accepted the “Best Website Design” award from the district (thanks to Rotarian Newman Aguiar whose work this reflects) as well as being cited as one of the winners of the RI Presidential Citations for meeting specified goals for the year that focused on growth in membership and commitment to RI ideals. District Governor Tim Mannix spoke with pride and enthusiasm about the \$1.2 million meals which were packaged by the district this year, and we heard presentations from the Boys and Girls Home and the Group Study Exchange team. Morning workshops then focused on readiness for new club officers and ideas for projects and club fellowship. Some 50 Interact high school students were meeting simultaneously, including three delegates from Durham Rotary's new Riverside High School club. The District Conference adjourned after lunch, with Governor Tim announcing April 18-19 as the dates for next year's conference.

April 24, 2007 was a great day for the Durham Rotary Club and a great day for the students participating in the AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) programs at Hillside and Southern High schools. The Durham Rotary Club hosted a lunch banquet at the Durham Marriott to recognize the accomplishments of the participating students. Attendance was outstanding! Over 130 students arrived in their "dressed for success" clothing to experience Rotary. The banquet started with a traditional Rotary practice, the Pledge of Allegiance. As students dined on catfish and chicken, Adam Kalkhof, son of fellow Rotarian Bill Kalkhof, addressed them and shared his personal journey as a star athlete at Jordan High School, a scholarship athlete at UNC, and as a professional base ball player. He stressed the importance of continuing their education and earning a college degree, no matter what other talents and interests they may have.



Carl Harris, fellow Rotarian and Durham Public Schools Superintendent, also addressed the students and spoke to them about staying on the right educational track as part of their personal plans to accomplish their goals and fulfill their life's dreams. The Durham Rotary Club also presented an AVID Excellence Award to one student from each school, selected by their teachers. After the banquet, Dr. Harris said "I assure you there are kids here who have never been to a banquet like this, where people are supporting their academic work."
