7/31 - "ROTARY MILLION MEALS KICKOFF PROGRAM"

Ray Buchanan, President of Raleigh, NC based Stop Hunger Now, outlined the latest data on the hunger issue and spoke of a new strategy to help mitigate and, hopefully in time, eradicate hunger.

The issue? Currently, it is projected that over 800 million people in the world are malnourished each day. Stop Hunger Now and other similar organizations are attempting to put strategies and plans in place to reduce that number. One nutritious meal a day will go along way to eliminate hunger at the individual level. The problem is there are 800 million men, women and children in the world in need of one good meal each day.

The solution? Operation Sharehouse is an effort to distribute nutritious meals to areas in need by working with schools in countries with high numbers of malnourished people. The operation will stock warehouses of meals that are easy to prepare and distribute them to the schools to feed the children attending. Instead of giving dollars only, Operation Sharehouse is designed to communicate to the public 1) the need is there; and 2) that individual actions can go a long way to helping with the solution.

How can you help? You can help by volunteering to package meals for Operation Sharehouse. The project has an efficient (and fun) way to create meals to be distributed.

Volunteer teams of nine people assemble packed bags of rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables, and a chicken/vegetable stock which includes 20 vitamins. Each bag contains six meals at a cost of about 20 cents per meal. Each team member can assemble on average 100 bags per hour. In a two hour shift, that is 200 bags per person. A nine person team can assemble 1800 bags!! At 6 meals per bag, that is 10,800 meals per team!! How rewarding is that??

You and eight of your best friends can get together for one two hour shift, make 1800 bags and feed 10,800!!! Who would not want to do this!!

What is our role? To lead the way for Rotary District 7710 in meeting the One Million Meal challenge set by District Governor Tim Mannix.

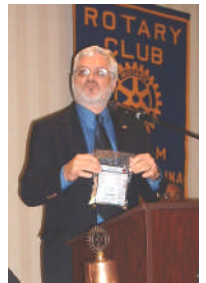
