04/16/07 – “Group Study Exchange Team – District 1750, France”



Our program on April 16th began with a short presentation by past presidents David Ross and Jim Hedrick about the Newsom Fellows program, which was the recognition for Rotarians giving \$1000 or more to Durham Rotary’s Centennial Campaign. Hedrick shared much information about the late Jim Newsom, president of our club from 1959-60 and a proud Rotarian till his death last year. Jim’s father, Eugene, was the only member of our club to be a Rotary International President (1929-30) and the family’s legacy was an important part of our club’s history. Hedrick portrayed Jim Newsom as a tremendous leader, a very successful trial lawyer and community citizen, and a great example of someone who lived the Rotary Four-Way Test.

The program continued with an exciting presentation to culminate the Durham visit of our Group Study Exchange (GSE) guests from Champagne and Bourgogne, France. George Habel and Alan DeLisle led the coordination of the GSE team visit to Durham and arranged 3 days full of activities that involved the 5 GSE members: *Patrick de Labroube, Charlotte Clenes, Badra Anwane, Emily Motu, Joe Sejean* and many members of our Durham Rotary club. They recounted the line-up of events, starting on the first day with a visit to Greystone Inn & Conference Center, our version of a "chateau" in Durham, including a Durham history presentation by Reyn Bowman. This was followed by a visit to the American Tobacco Complex and a fun outing to a Durham Bulls baseball game, complete with hot dogs, graciously hosted by George Habel and the Durham Bulls. The second day included a tour of Duke University, coordinated by Susan Ross and Sam Miglarese, followed by a tour and lunch with a larger group of club members at the Nasher Museum. The afternoon featured a trip to the RTP Club, followed by a potluck dinner hosted by the North Durham Rotary Club. Day 3 featured a tour of North Carolina Central University. Alan and George thanked all of the Club members who were involved in various aspects of the GSE visit, especially B.C. Dash, Newman Aguiar, Melissa Mills, and Arthur Rodgers who hosted the exchange guests in their homes.

Next the GSE group gave a PowerPoint presentation highlighting their overall visit to District 7710 in North Carolina and Washington, D.C., and how each of them had meaningful experiences that related to their career interests. The group shared information about the Rotary District 1750 in France, including the towns of Reims (population 250,000), Beaune (population 30,000), and Dijon (population 230,000), and talked about the wines produced in the Wine District of Champagne (sparkling, mostly white), and Bourgogne (red wines). Quite a contrast with Durham, they noted that the history of this region extends back in time over 2,000 years to the Roman Empire.

For career development, Badra, who is an intensive care nurse, visited at Rex Hospital and Duke Hospital, and was impressed with the advanced computerized data management that integrates the patient history, medical treatment and billing systems. Charlotte, who is an event manager in France, spent time at the convention centers in Raleigh and Chapel Hill. Emily, who specializes in cross-cultural training and integration for non-city agencies, social workers, and city/regional government offices and corporations, spent time at Meredith College and also at the Center for International Understanding in Chapel Hill. She also met someone from Durham at the Nasher lunch who does the same type of work that she does. Joe (Patrice-Joseph), is a consultant in Human Resources and specializes in negotiation and conflict resolution, and also provides software to improve HR management. While here in North Carolina, he spent time with the McLaurin Company that specializes in human resources management. The group also spent a day in Washington D.C. touring Arlington Cemetery, Washington Monument, White House, and Smithsonian Museum, and also toured other cities in North Carolina.

Patrick, the leader of the group is a retired Eastman Kodak manager and a Rotarian from District 1750 in France. He closed the program by exchanging club and District flags with President Susan. Anna Jones asked the group what most surprised them about the United States. They responded that they were very moved by the ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington Cemetery, and they were surprised and very impressed with the great sense of national identity in the U.S., and that regardless of where people are from, they all unite as Americans. They were very appreciative of our Durham Rotary Club hospitality.
