"Duke Chapel - "The University's Listening Heart"

Sam Wells, Dean of Duke Chapel



Our Thanksgiving program was delivered by Sam Wells, Dean of Duke Chapel. He was introduced by Andy Barada. Dean Well's seductively low key presentation managed to combine an appropriate Thanksgiving message, describe the role of Duke Chapel and explain why Duke selected him (and he selected Duke) last year "to keep the heart of the university listening to the Heart of God."

As Dean of the Chapel he is first responsible for the signature university building that is used for its most solemn gatherings as well as about 100 weddings annually. Secondly, he oversees more than two dozen "religious life" groups on campus. Finally, it gives him the opportunity to build a congregation...non-denominational but with a Protestant Christian bent...both on the campus and in the larger community. In this last role he cited Christ's example in the gospel of Mark of associating with his disciples, the poor, and those in authority with the purpose of bringing the community together.

Without calling himself a leader, he described his leadership role in a small community in England in a community regeneration experiment sponsored by Tony Blair's government. He learned that poverty is not about money and that two things make a community tick; having people around you that you can trust, and imagination. His mission at Duke Chapel includes fostering these communities of imagination. His answer for how to do this was to show a degree of humility by being out in the community and to build partnerships with others.

Dean Wells' outreach message enlightened a program that also recognized several new Paul Harris fellows and had dozens of us sign up for bell ringing and to purchase poinsettias. The Thanksgiving theme seemed to go beyond being thankful for what we had to being thankful for what we could give.

History of The Rotary

Foundation

In 1917, Arch C. Klumph, Rotary's sixth president, proposed to the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA, the creation of an "endowment fund for Rotary . . . for the purpose of doing good in the world in charitable, educational, and other avenues of community service." A few months later, the endowment received its first contribution of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA. In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, the fund was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International. . . . After Rotary founder Paul P. Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring into Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created for the purpose of building the Foundation.

. . . That same year, the first Foundation program was established — Fellowships for Advanced Study, which was the forerunner of the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarships program. Then in 1965-66, three new programs were launched — Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.
