“Duke University Medical School”

R. Sanders “Sandy” Williams, MD



On Monday, January 8, 2007, the Durham Rotary Club was honored to have as guest speaker, Dr. R. Sanders “Sandy” Williams, MD, Dean of the School of Medicine and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at Duke University.

Dr. Williams spoke about the Duke School of Medicine which is the second largest component of Duke Medicine, about half the size of the Duke Health System. The two primary goals for his presentation were to raise the level of awareness about what the Duke Medical School (DMS) does, and to seek the community’s partnership in the School’s over arching goals and activities.

Duke Medical School is a top rated medical institution; and is consistently ranked in the top ten (10) nationally, and in some areas of medicine it is ranked in the top three (3). The goal of the School of Medicine is that advancements that happen in the area of medicine, be pioneered at Duke. The core mission of the DMS is to produce the next generation of outstanding doctors and leaders in the field of medicine. DMS has an operational budget of 800 million dollars with less than 10% coming from clinic operations. The medical school receives on average 6,000 applications for admission a year, but only accepts 200 new applicants each year to the medical program. Duke’s admissions requirements are the second most stringent of the nation’s premier medical institutions.

The medical school has an enrollment of 800 students. These are composed of MDs, PhDs, and PAs. In addition to the students, there are 800 residents and fellows, and 800 practicing doctors, who spend on average about half their time in research and teaching. Another 800 faculty exclusively work in research and teaching. All of the V.A. doctors are part of Duke’s staff; some of whom practice in the VA without compensation.

Duke is a national leader with its Center for HIV/AIDS Vaccine Immunology (CHAVI), and also has the country’s leading program in the study and treatment of brain tumors.

In the area of community activities, the Duke Health System employs 7,000 people which creates economic strength, provides 15,000 hours of community service, and partners with the community in health programs such as Just for Us in home care, which increases the standard of care, LATCH (Local Access To Community Health), Durham Community Health Care, which helps people on Medicaid, and many others.

Dr. Williams concluded his presentation by stating that medicine is moving in new and different directions, *i.e.* electronic health records, global partnerships, and presenting a research-friendly image and posture, along with other medical and scientific advances. Duke University Medical Center wants to be in the forefront of these new developments, but needs the partnership with other segments of the Durham community to be successful.

Multiple shifts were also worked by President-elect Toby Barfield, Abel Ekpunobi, Lloyd Schmeidler (and a great team from Urban Ministries), and Malcolm White. Numerous other Rotarians from our club and the RTP and North Durham clubs were there for 1-3 hours during the day. It was a huge team effort, with great media coverage and special appearances by NCCU chancellor James Ammons, Duke President Richard Brodhead, NCCU Provost Beverly Washington Jones, and many faculty and staff from the two institutions as well as more than 600 student volunteers. TROSA provided volunteers and a truck as a special contribution to the effort, and Pepsi provided free drinks for the volunteers. Stop Hunger Now received cash contributions to help sponsor the event from Cherokee Investments, Wachovia, and Capitol Broadcasting. Durham Rotarians have really done their part for the Million Meals program this year – thanks to all who helped with their volunteer time and to those whose support of the Durham Rotary Community Fund enabled our club to financially support this effort.

The queen honored Boyd for his work in the New Zealand community, which he's served as a Rotarian since 1971. He's also served in his community as an elder and youth leader in the Presbyterian church, scout master, secretary of several school committees, and 30 years as a rugby referee with the rugby union.
