“Duke University Health System”

Dr. Victor Dzau, President - Duke Health System

Rotary’s own MaryAnn Black introduced Dr. Victor J. Dzau, President and CEO of Duke University Health System (DUHS). The former President of Harvard Medical School and the Brigham and Women’s Hospital in Boston was appointed Chancellor in July of 2004 and was awarded the James B. Duke Professor of Medicine. Dr. Dzau is the recipient of numerous awards, appointments and honors during his distinguished career.

Dr. Dzau spoke very highly of Durham and shared how his childhood experiences as a refugee from China fueled his sense of social and civic responsibilities in meeting human needs through the practice of medicine. He reflected upon Duke’s 75th Anniversary this year and stated that the health system is positioned to move forward and realize its fullest potential. Duke Medicine is comprised of the Duke Health System, which has three hospitals, the School of Nursing, the Medical School, the Private Diagnostic Clinics, and an extensive network of private physicians in the community. It employs roughly 25,000 people and has an annual budget over \$23 billion. It is the largest employer in Durham and the fourth largest hospital in North Carolina, performing 60,000 surgeries and 1.5 million outpatient visits per year. Dr. Dzau stated that DUHS is built upon a culture of quality, trust and compassion. Duke’s emphasis on quality is demonstrated through its commitment to safety and accountability. He also spoke of the importance of demonstrating compassion and the continuing challenge of building and maintaining the public’s trust. As a result, Duke is always ranked as one of the top 10 medical facilities in the nation (currently #5), and the only hospital to be highly ranked in both research and primary care. Dr. Dzau stressed that the outcome of what DUHS does is most important. Are patients getting better? Are lives being saved? Is pain being relieved? Do research discoveries make a difference?



The Health System’s partnership with the community is a major commitment Duke has made. Dr. Dzau pointed out there are currently more than 89 collaborative partnership projects between DUHS and Durham. He stated that Duke must remain a key player in the future, continuing initiatives already underway such as those that address hypertension, diabetes and substance abuse. He is particularly interested in eliminating health disparities among underrepresented populations and the socio-economically disadvantaged. Dr. Dzau concluded by challenging members of Rotary to ask themselves, what can we as business leaders in Durham, do to promote the health and wellness in our own organizations. . . . *Carolyn Titus*

As of 1 July 2005, the Rotary Fellowships program belongs to a new parent entity known as **Global Networking Groups**. The new entity includes groups of individual Rotarians organized to focus on shared topics of interest on an international basis. Effective 1 July 2006, all existing and future fellowship groups with a service-oriented focus will be reclassified under a new category called Rotarian Action Groups, while existing and future fellowship groups focusing on fellowship of a recreational or vocational nature will remain under the designation of Rotary Fellowships. During this period of transition, both Rotary Fellowships and Rotarian Action Groups will be represented on the Rotary Fellowships pages of the RI Web site. Pending the development of a separate Rotarian Action Groups Web page, both pages will be linked through a common portal for Global Networking Groups. Please check back periodically for further updates.

Global Networking Groups currently comprise more than 90 independent Rotary Fellowships and Rotarian Action Groups. Join the growing number of Rotarians who are sharing their favorite activities and professional interests through organized recreational and vocational groups in Rotary Fellowships, or explore new opportunities for international partnership in service in Rotarian Action Groups. Whether you are interested in bird watching, motorcycling, volunteer dentistry, or the fight against AIDS, Rotary's Global Networking Groups are fantastic resources for all Rotarians to develop new friendships and to advance opportunities for service.

Rotarians for Fighting Aids Take Action

The Rotarians For Fighting AIDS ("RFFA") are working proof that they are a Rotarian Action Group. During their first year of existence, the African Network for Children Orphaned and at Risk ("ANCHOR"), a project that RFFA started and has a key role in sustaining, was approved for a grant of U.S. government funds in the amount of \$8.1 million for a project partnership plan that will improve the well-being and protection of 146,000 orphans and vulnerable children in six African countries by building the capacity of families and communities to cope and to respond.

TABU alumni are proof of program's success

It could have simply become a fond memory of an adolescent adventure — an excursion across the ocean to spend 10 days with teenagers in another country. End of story. But for these past participants of TABU (Toward a Better Understanding), it became the first chapter in an experience that continues to transform their lives. . . . Since 1992, about 90 teenagers have participated in TABU, a project of the Rotary clubs of Belfast, Northern Ireland, and Highland Park, Illinois, USA. Each year, TABU alternates between sending six students, ages 16-18, between Belfast and the United States.
