"Pearl Harbor Relevance for Today"

Professor Joe Caddell, Historian

Monday's talk aimed to convince us that America's spy efforts need to indulge in a major piece of groupthink.

On June 5, Professor Joe Caddell's talk, "Pearl Harbor: Relevance for Today?" defied the expectations of this particular scribe by remaining sharp, funny and provocative until the end.

A former U.S. Air Force intelligence officer, Caddell teaches at N.C. State and UNC. He earned his B.A. at UNC-Chapel Hill and his PhD in military history at Duke.

"The American intelligence community still studies Pearl Harbor," Caddell said. "It's still relevant. It's one of the best examples of how synthesis in intelligence fails."

Pearl Harbor happened for the same reason September 11 happened, he said: The U.S. intelligence community didn't "synthesize," or connect the dots between, the many different pieces of information it had.

Lots of agencies - NSA, CIA, FBI, the Pentagon, and the State Department -- knew lots of different things about what was about to happen on December 7, 1941. But they didn't share the information and come up with a big picture. On the contrary, they tried not to share it. ("In Washington, information is power.")

Pearl Harbor lends itself to teaching about intelligence failure because, first, it *was* a huge intelligence failure, and second, it happened so long ago that it's completely noncontroversial. All the government information on it has been declassified.

Caddell urged us to inform ourselves about the need for synthesis in U.S. intelligence-gathering ("Read the 9/11 report") and to hold our Senators' and Representatives' feet to the fire until they start demanding that our intelligence community start "synthesizing."

The U.S. needs to keep gathering intelligence, he said. But we must synthesize it. We need oversight over how it's gathered. And we need some sort of national board that literally forces different agencies to share information.

The orientation meetings organized by ESSEX at Smith Mountain Lake, VA that included IYE students from four other Districts were memorable too. We shared many experiences together and it felt like a world of intermingled cultures when I was with them.
