## 6/12 - "Durham Technical Community College: An Overview"

Phail Wynn, Jr., Ed.D., M.B.A.

With dynamic charisma and wit, Rotarian Dr. Phail Wynn addressed our club on June 12, providing a chronological overview of Durham Technical Community College's past 45 years. Dr. Wynn has graced his position as President of this esteemed institution since 1980.

When introduced, Rotarian Seth Jernigan indicated that Dr. Wynn is an outstanding citizen with an incredible list of notable accomplishments. He has been an active Rotarian since 1981, received his masters and doctorate degrees from North Carolina State University, served on numerous local, State and national boards. Also, he is a former United State Army Green Beret. Dr. Wynn has made a remarkable impact on education in this community and throughout the nation. With focus, he had been instrumental in guiding Durham Technical Community College into its current role as an innovative model of excellence in education and driver of economic vitality.

In his message, Dr. Wynn emphasized the importance of teamwork and partnership development in Durham Tech's success. Community, corporate, educational, and collegiate partnerships have been paramount to its growth. His overview provided the following facts:

Durham Tech first opened its doors in 1961 as the Durham Industrial Education Center with an enrollment of 34 male students and 4 programs.

Durham Tech is currently located on more than 67 combined acres.

As of May 2006, there is an enrollment of over 25,000 different students with 75 degrees, diplomas and certificate programs.

Durham Tech serves a diverse student body with almost equal ethnic representation, more than 98 countries represented.

Programming includes more than 100 courses at off-campus locations such as NC Mutual (Small Business Center), Northern Durham and Orange County.

Unique course opportunities are offered for online-part classroom programs.

Durham Tech has incorporated program offerings such as dental labs, clinical trial research, nurse training programs with medical centers, law enforcement academy, work force development for industry training and retention, middle college high school, developmental studies in math, reading and English and college transfer programs to area universities just to mention a few. One of their noblest program focuses is centered on assisting high school dropouts, displaced workers and those who feel that Durham Tech is their only chance for an education.

The new entity includes groups of individual Rotarians organized to focus on shared topics of interest on an international basis. Effective 1 July 2006, all existing and future fellowship groups with a service-oriented focus will be reclassified under a new category called Rotarian Action Groups, while existing and future fellowship groups focusing on fellowship of a recreational or vocational nature will remain under the designation of Rotary Fellowships. The Rotarians For Fighting AIDS ("RFFA") are working proof that they are a Rotarian Action Group. During their first year of existence, the African Network for Children Orphaned and at Risk ("ANCHOR"), a project that RFFA started and has a key role in sustaining, was approved for a grant of U.S. government funds in the amount of \$8.1 million for a project partnership plan that will improve the well-being and protection of 146,000 orphans and vulnerable children in six African countries by building the capacity of families and communities to cope and to respond.
